I have been a member of the Ottawa Power and Sail Squadron since 1994 and joined the Bridge as the Communications Officer in early 2002, and then the Rideau Ripples Editor in 2004 and next the XO in 2005. I have enjoyed each of my responsibilities and look forward to this new challenging responsibility.

I have always been interested in boats and boating. Although I am a non-swimmer I find myself fascinated with the beauty and peacefulness of bodies of water. My boating pastime started way back in 1969 in Vancouver when I took a sailing course with a company called the Jib Set. This allowed me to rent

their 26' sailboats and I would continue to rent sailboats whenever the opportunity arose, including a bare boat charter in the Virgin Islands on a Hughes 40

After more than 20 years away from the water, a chance over night stay in the St. Lawrence River on our neighbours wooden Chris Craft made us realise how much we missed boating. In late October of 1993 we purchased a 1956 35' Chris Craft Constellation (yup, a wood boat) which was already set away for the winter, up on wood pilings under cover at French Bay in Clayton, New York.

This turned out to be a lucky break as it allowed us to take the boating course with the idea that we would learn the skills necessary to bring the boat safely into Canada. Thirteen wonderful years later we sold the ole wooden boat to do something different. Well, how was I to know that; once a river rat, always a river rat, and consequently we only lasted one and half years on shore and in September 2004 we purchased a fibreglass boat in Maryland and had ourselves quite an adventure bringing the boat to Canada on its own bottom. We now cruise out of Williams Marine on the St. Lawrence River.

We started our CPS adventure taking a boating course and continued on with many more courses. I highly recommend that you consider taking a course. Our instructors are very knowledgeable and have a passion for passing this information on to our students.

I also highly recommend that you consider participating in some of our Squadron activities. We have many social and informational events throughout the year for you — all boating related and of course membership is not required to attend, so bring along a friend. We have a blast at our Annual Picnic.

The 2007 CPS Annual Conference will be held in Ottawa from October 24th to 28th this year. I encourage you to attend this National Event since it is happening right here in our back yard. If you have some spare time, why not consider donating a couple of hours of your time to help the Ottawa Squadron as well as all the other Squadrons in our District play host to boaters from all across Canada.

he CPS Annual Conference (October 24 - 28, 2007) will be hosted by the Rideau District at the Ottawa Marriott, located at 100 Kent Street in downtown Ottawa.

2007 marks the 175th anniversary of the opening, in 1832, of the Rideau Canal, North America's oldest continuously operating waterway. CPS and the Rideau District will join Parks Canada in its yearlong celebration of the culture, heritage and uniqueness of

the Rideau Canal, which runs from Ottawa to Kingston.

The Rideau Canal and Waterway, which provides some of the finest boating in North America, has been designated a "National Historic Site" and Parks Canada has applied to have the Canal designated a UNESCO "World Heritage Site". The decision, from UNESCO, should be announced shortly before our Conference.



- 15. SO, I TRIED RETIREMENT AND FOUND THAT I'M PERFECT FOR THE JOB!






