

# **Do You Have Moisture In Your Boat?**

This is the proverbial question we all have when buying or maintaining a boat. You can have moisture readings done on your hull and decks but what about the interior?

Now that we have all put our babies to bed for the winter, what precautions did you do to avoid moisture, and then mould, from gathering inside your boat? Did you cover it? Shrink wrap it? Both of these are great ideas for maintaining a dry interior but what if there was already moisture inside and you have just contained the problem.

Having had a lot of water drained inside our boat one winter, we now use a dehumidifying product. Our problem was from a cockpit pipe which collected small amounts of water which froze then collected more and froze again finally pushing the double pipe clamps off the connection and draining into the boat bilge. Oh by the way, insurance didn't cover it......ice damage! Don't we live in Canada?

Preparing your boat for the winter is just as important as doing all the summer maintenance. There are a lot of dehumidifying products available today. If you are lucky enough to have power, use a low power plug in one to keep the moisture levels down. If not, buy one of the many box products. They are designed to remove any moisture from the air and will need replacing from time to time. Place them in the most prone places and keep an eye on them. If you have shrink wrapped your boat, put one or two of these in also.

The other good precaution is to have your vessel well ventilated. We pull our knot meter each winter, allowing air to circulate and keeping out animals. They always find ways to warm protected areas! Mothballs, the cedar ones, are good deterrents for these critters. Just remember, they are poisonous so put them in something so you are not touching them.

Hope you did all these things so that next spring will be a happy reunion with your boat..

# Maintain Situational Awareness

Situational Awareness promotes safety and environmental protection

"Situational Awareness" (SA) is a term most commonly associated with the military, especially aviation, where it is defined as one's awareness of the surroundings. Fighter pilots are trained that SA is crucial to their effectiveness and safety. Anyone who has driven a car is familiar with SA and its implications, particular since the advent of cell phones and other distracting devices. Actually SA is more complex than any of the above examples. While we may talk about having or not having SA, it's best to think of it as a skill rather than a commodity. Like docking a boat in close quarters in a cross wind. SA is a skill that can be learned, practiced and perfected.

What does SA have to do with protecting the marine environment? Consider the following scenario. Two boaters pull up along a fuel dock. One has music blaring, guests moving about fussing with shoes, clothing and other distractions while the captain spins off the deck fill cap. He takes the fuel nozzle from the attendant and thrusts it in the fuel port and fills his tank while jiggling to the music. Meanwhile the other boater turns off all electrics, has everyone step ashore and attaches a "catch cup" below his fuel vent port. Finally he takes the fuel nozzle from the attendant and pokes it through an absorbent pad before inserting it into the fuel port. Which of these two boaters do you think is more likely to have a fuel spill or another accident? And if an accident occurs, which of these two is more likely to respond in a timely, appropriate manner that reduces harm to others and to the environment? Which of these two boaters displays greater Situational Awareness?

Whether it's filling up at the dock, performing an oil change or doing some paintwork, many routine activities that boaters perform have the potential to cause physical and environmental harm. Beyond simply "knowing what you're doing," as taught in all CPS courses, maintaining Situational Awareness reduces the likelihood of accidents occurring and enables us to respond more quickly and appropriately when they do.

### A NEW Boat and Engine Maintenance Course

CPS recently announced the introduction of a new Boat and Engine Maintenance Course to its line-up of boater education programs. This name is new too - this course was formerly known simply as Marine Maintenance.

CPS –Ottawa has chosen to present the 12 week course in the2012 winter term. Weekly Wednesday evening classes start on January 11th at St. Patrick's High School - Alta Vista Drive at Heron Road. The course is open to both CPS members and the public and does not require any prerequisite courses. More information and on-line registration can be found on the CPS-Ottawa website.

Boats include equipment and machinery systems that range from simple to sophisticated with ever increasing computer "black boxes" thrown in to add mystery. When any of this stuff "acts-out" it can be challenging for both "start and go" captains and knowledgeable "do-it-yourselfers" to diagnose the faults and then to perform or direct the repairs. A good understanding of how the machinery works and how it behaves when it doesn't work are the first steps to diagnosing and correcting problems.

The course covers both inboard and outboard gas and diesel propulsion systems and maintenance in significant depth. Whole boat operating systems and maintenance are addressed together with off-season works and winterizing. Lottsa good stuff for an inquisitive captain or an aspiring do-it-yourselfer.

The course materials are excellent and the teaching aids look great. Much can be learned that is both new and relevant from the both the course materials and the varied experiences of all the class participants.

If you have ever wondered what's that noise or why doesn't it work – come for the course - the knowledge gained may help you figure it out.

### Maritime Radio Course

The Maritime Radio course teaches emergency radio procedures and everyday operating techniques.

I have a cell phone so why VHF? Many boaters do have a cell phone. So what's the phone number of the closest boater/Coast Guard when you are in trouble?

VHF radio is for boaters. It is a general broadcast system used by boaters, and it's function is to enable you to call for assistance, call on behalf of someone else requiring assistance, report hazards such a floating trees/logs, get the latest weather reports and of course contact and talk to other boating friends.

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
