Part II of Nick & Hetty Baets cruising from Sarasota to Marathon FL (for Part I see March 2014 issue and Part II November issue)

Monday 16 December: In the morning we meet a lady in the laundry room from a 36ft Island Packet named "Kismet" who has been to the Bahamas with her husband several times and we pump her for some information on how, where, when and the like. Right of the bat she tells us we should count on taking at least 6 weeks to visit the Bahamas and gives good pointers where to wait for a crossing in Biscayne Bay. She also tells us they just had another granddaughter born in New York but she has no plans to go visit with all the snow and cold going on there right now. The eastern US has already suffered three good winter storms in a little over a week's time. We say our goodbyes and I go to pick up a last bag of ice before our departure. I return to Solitude with most of the ice intact and we have to get her ready for the impending crossing, estimated to take close to 24 hrs. Prior to sailing all sorts of precautions are necessary before casting off: tying down the dinghy with cross-braced lines, closing down the hatches, and putting every loose item away so that nothing can roll around when we're heeling. At noon sharp we let go of our buoy line and slowly motor out of the harbor following the

shipping channel. Once out we head for the Mo(A) 16ft "SC" marker in the San Carlos Bay, our starting waypoint. When we pass the marker I press the "Navigate" button on my GPS and we are seriously on our way to our next waypoint: FW0088 at Big Marco Pass. Unfortunately the northern wind is only 8-10kn and on our starboard hind quarter. Not what the forecast has said (10-15kn) so while we raise the jib, we leave the engine running at low rpms to



ensure we are making at least 5kn or better. But it is sunny with only a few clouds and life is reasonably pleasant. Running before the wind, however, has a bit of a motion problem due to the waves. For whatever reason, the wind and waves come from different directions. A 2-3ft swell is slapping us on our starboard rear quarter resulting in an unpleasant rolling motion. We cruise by the banana shaped Estero Island and watch the familiar landmarks go by. First the new library building, then the sun's glitter on the rows of gleaming motor homes at the Red Cocoanut RV park, then the microwave tower. Finally we pass the two tall blue roofed apartment buildings right behind the Publix where we did our grocery shopping only days ago. The motor home park is interesting. While moored at the Ft. Myers basin we see many couples our age go back and forth in dinghies from their boat to shore running errands or simply to go for a meal on shore. They all tie up at the city dinghy dock under the bridge. While one jumps out and ties up, the other hands-over bags and then hops ashore. To go to Publix, the only decent grocery store at Ft. Myers Beach, we take the trolley bus along Estero Blvd, all for 25¢ for people over 65. On the trolley we meet folks staying at the RV Park, like us mostly retirees going about their business. When we observe them getting on and off the trolley with great concentration, carefully one step at a time often taking a full minute or so to get on or off, it is clear that there is a big disparity between the fitness and health of boat people vs. RV people. I'm glad we are boat people. We slowly head out further and aim for a course 2nm out, parallel to the coastline. Lunch consists of a couple of buns with Gouda cheese from Costco and a cold

drink. We polish things off with an apple. Every now and then a couple of dolphins show up ahead of the boat. They usually head straight for our bow and linger for a while next to the boat before peeling off. I call Hetty who invariably comes running up with a camera in hand. But today, although curious, they approach us but don't stay long. Close to 1600 we are passing north Naples and the Gordon Inlet. I record our position every hour on the hour in my logbook. The north part of Naples' shoreline consists of miles of 20 story condominium towers vying for glitzy awards. But they are all grouped together single file along the shore, thus restricting beach access to the public. The condos all have gated entrances so nobody can get to the beach for a good five mile stretch I'd say. On the other hand, the south shore of Naples is adorned with beautiful residences, interspersed with many beach access points, where you can park your car and go for a beach walk; clearly far more neighbourly citizens or perhaps they simply have less clout with the local politicians. This is an area where a 5 million dollar home would be labeled modest. We see the last remnants of Ft. Myers tallest buildings disappear behind us and notice the first signs of the Marco Island apartment buildings up ahead. The sun is steadily heading for the horizon. A 50ft catamaran comes out of Gordon Pass for a sunset sail while a 30ft cruiser is heading home under sail. A bit later we see them furl both sails and they enter



Gordon pass on motor. From my GPS I figure out that moonrise for our location is 1720 and sunset 1738, so at least for a short while we should have both stellar elements in plain view. The catamaran makes a perfect silhouette in the red sky against the setting sun. But not long after the promised time we see a full moon poke its bright head over a low string of clouds as the sun, while turning orange and red is seeking cover behind a

similar string of clouds along the opposite horizon. The wind has picked up and we sail with only our jib out under peaceful serenity of the wind. Suddenly at twilight the condos at Marco Island become much more pronounced featuring a sea of white lights blazing along the shore line. Around 1900 we round red marker "2" at Big Marco Pass and I set the GPS to the FW0087

waypoint at Cape Romano. In the dark it is hard to judge the distance to a light aid but my plotter helps ensuring we don't accidentally hit the marker. Hetty suggests we have dinner but I ask her to wait until after we skillfully negotiate our way around a rectangle marked "Obstn Fish Haven" on our chart. Once we pass by Marco Island Hetty goes below and heats up dinner in the galley: left-over spaghetti. We sit together and



consume our Italian treat in silence up in the cockpit. The moon shines bright overhead as the shore lights glide by in the distance. At 2000 we are skirting the extensive Cape Romano Shoals. We notice two bright white lights moving fast along our western horizon, heading north. We soon realize this is the Key West Express heading back to Ft. Myers; in an hour and a quarter it will arrive thanks to its 30kn (55km/h) cruising speed. One light is the bow light; the other a bit higher is the mast light. Amazing, we are well beyond the 3mile limit and still have to check our draft because of the shoals! But, an hour later we pass the shallow area and are

now settling in for the night while heading straight for Vaca Key and Marathon. The wind has really picked up and I have to reef the jib to calm the motion of the boat a bit. We are doing over 5kn on a 17kn wind, fine by me. There are no more lights, except for the moon that by now smiled upon us like the Cheshire cat. All we can see is the low silhouette of uninhabited Kice Island to the east and for the rest nothing but a watery horizon. Our ETA at Marathon is 1100 tomorrow morning, much like we have planned for. At 2200 Hetty goes down for a snooze while I keep watch.

What is MAREP? Sue Baker SN

What does MAREP stand for?

It is a short form for **Ma**rine **Rep**orting. It is a joint effort run by The Canadian Power and Sail Squadron (CPSS) and The Canadian Hydrographic Service (CHS) to correct misplaced navigational equipment or report dangerous items to other boaters such as logs just under the water or buoys whose lights have been extinguished. These will come out as "Notices to Mariners" until charts or objects have been corrected.

They could be from THS Nautical Charts, List of Lights, Sailing directions or Tide and Current Publications.

What to do?

If you encounter something untoward on the waters, you should report it to your MAREP officer in your local CPSS who will in turn pass it along to the proper authorities and will follow up to make sure things have been tended to and corrected.

These include:

- Submerged objects
- Objects of danger above or below the water
- Problems with sailing directions
- Problems with the List of Lights
- Problems with the publication of Tides and Currents
- Suggestions for better and/or safer boating for all

It is also where you can go to suggest changes to charts or navigational aids. Quite often, those who boat in the area are more aware of problems than the "powers that be".

Don't be shy to report! Call or email your MAREP officer for everyone's sake.


