Part IV of Nick & Hetty Baets cruising from Sarasota to Marathon FL. (For Part I see March '14 issue, Part II November '14 issue, Part III Jan '15 issue)

Monday 16 December: At 2200 Hetty goes down for a snooze while I keep watch. The boat still corkscrews but the wind is veering to east and the waves are coming more from behind and are overtaking us. At first the stern gets lifted a couple of feet and you pick up speed. Then the wave passes under you and you are on a roller coaster; eventually it passes the bow and you slow down a bit as you sink in the trough between two waves. On and on this never ending motion continues. But the waves have white edges, a clear sign there is a good blow. We make steady progress and just before midnight we pass the midway point of our sail. I can no longer see the moon because it's too high, but I can see a bright spot shining through the Bimini cover where the moon is standing overhead. The best part is that in the bright full moon light I can clearly see the horizon 360° around me. A nice reference and a big help in not getting sea sick. The waves are a bit higher but only once in a while do we get smacked with a big one on the stern. When that happens spray goes as high as my GPS parked on the cockpit table. I sit with a blanket wrapped around my body checking for lights every 10 minutes or so. It's 0000 and we quietly slide into **Tuesday the 17**th.

At midnight Hetty re-appears and I suggest we run the engine for a bit to re-charge the batteries as the Autohelm is working overtime to keep us on track. After a while I go under to try and catch some shut-eye. But it does not work for me. The motion of the boat is too rough and I roll around wildly in my bunk. After a while I call it quits and go back up to keep Hetty company. At 0200 she goes down and I am alone again. I check our progress and heading. As expected, the wind is pushing us off course to the lee a bit and I correct our course from 154° to 145°. At 0400 Hetty comes up for air and she persuades me to try to get some sleep once more. Except for the stars and the moon we see no other lights at all. The wind is down to 15kn and the motion of the boat has eased. I crawl in bed, nicely pre-warmed by Hetty and actually fall asleep! An hour and a half later I wake up but stay under till 0600. By this time we are a little over 24nm away from our next and last waypoint: FK0128, just north of Marathon at John Sawyer Bank. Hetty points out three very bright white lights along the horizon up ahead, but they seem much too bright to come from shore. Indeed, they soon turn out to be from fish boats working their crab pots. Hetty goes down for a last snooze but not for long. Around 0700 we suddenly loose speed and the rudder does nothing anymore. Just like what happened to us two years ago on our overnight trip to Key West. I call Hetty and we conclude that we've picked up a crab pot line or something the like. We decide to furl the jib and see if when we take away all forward motion the entanglement will drop to the bottom. We fear turning on the engine because of the possibility of a buoy line wrapping itself around our prop. That would really be a problem. Anyway, our strategy works and whatever got hung up seems to be no longer hanging on. We start up the engine, turn the boat into the wind and set our full jib. Soon we are making 5-6kn again and our ETA is back to 1100. The sun rises at 0708 but because of the low clouds, all we see is a diffused yellow light stain to our port bow behind a strip of clouds. The bright white lights of the fishermen are scooting by; we can now see their navigation lights as well and they are busy clearing traps and setting new ones. Amazing how they can cause such a hazard and risk for pleasure cruisers but apparently business is business. I still feel they should pay if I wind one of their buoy lines around my prop and need to hire a diver to free the mess. At 0800 Hetty goes down to prepare a few buns and tea for our breakfast. The sun is trying hard to break through and not long thereafter we are sailing comfortably on the jib towards our final waypoint. At 1100 we are passing the G "17" marker and call the Marathon Yacht Club by cell phone as instructed when we booked a slip for the night the day before. They give us instructions but I still ask that they post someone at the boat slip we are assigned. No problem, they don't have a dock master but the maintenance supervisor is sent out to help us dock. So said, so done and 20 minutes later we have safely arrived and are tied up. I go register at the admin office; good thing I have my Sarasota Yacht Club membership card with me. We are welcomed by Bill & Jann Mellman; he is the past commodore for the Club. They give us a handy goody-bag with all sorts of information on what to see and do in Marathon. They also invite us to join them in the evening for a cocktail Christmas party: drinks and a plethora of snacks at \$18 per person. In the afternoon we walk for awhile along US 1 and do a bit of shopping before heading back to the Club. Hetty does the laundry, I rinse off the boat, fill our water tanks and we then both have a lovely shower. There is nothing like feeling clean again. Back on Solitude we take a well-deserved snooze. At 1800 we join the 30-40 or so club members and have lovely drinks while chatting with the others. Hetty bumps into a retired guy from St. Gallen, Switzerland. St. Gallen is situated at 2500ft above sea level and is one of Switzerland's highest cities. We visited it in 1967 and have nice memories from a beautiful library building they have. We join a table with Steve and Chris; he originally from Baltimore, she from New York. Both live here full time only because of the climate. He is a stock broker who works from home and she manages the finances of the small private airport on Marathon. Housing prices are not bad they say, but home insurance, a must if you have a mortgage, is outrageous. On a \$275,000 home they pay a staggering \$8,000 a year flood insurance! But then later Hetty finds out, from the lady giving the tour at the local turtle hospital, that during the last big storm, hurricane "Wilma" in 2005, the whole island flooded up to knee height. It is bound to happen again.

Wednesday 18 December: We say goodbye to Bill & Jann Mellman who we hope to see again in 2015 on Big Rideau Lake when they plan to do the great circle route. We leave the Marathon Yacht Club, after a pump-out, with a stiff cross wind. It is not easy to turn around and motor out of the narrow channel with a 42ft boat. And a bit scary with a row of menacing rip-rap sticking out above the water along the west edge. We then motor around to Boot Key Harbour; first we head 2nm west, then

go under the hump in the 7 Mile Bridge at the Moser Channel and then back to the harbor entrance. The channel is well marked but currents run swiftly with either tide. We call the City Marina on Channel 16 and are given very clear and detailed directions to Buoy C1. We are lucky because it's close to the dinghy dock. There are some 200 boats in the harbor and surprisingly 95% of them are sailboats. Turns out many simply sail down here to overwinter. Our neighbor, Bob White, comes from South Carolina and avoids frost this





maintenance on their boat.

way. His boat is called "The White House". occasional cruisers like us. They sport deep bronzed tans, have bicycles or even a car in the marina parking lot, and tarpaulin covers over the cockpits. The marina is well organized, with credit card type access to the washrooms and showers. The marina building has a large space with 2 flat screen TVs, a row of picnic tables along a wall for people to work on their tablet or laptop accessing the internet, and a huge collection of books to read and exchange. At \$125 a week this seems very reasonable. Outside is an ice machine and they even have a workshop for those needing to do some

Plastic microbeads, tiny pieces of plastic smaller than 1mm in diameter, are turning up in our rivers, oceans, in the guts of many aquatic animals and even in our beer!

Cosmetics companies have been adding these non-biodegradable plastic beads to personal care products such as facial and body scrubs and toothpastes. These products are eventually rinsed down our drains and travel to your local wastewater treatment facility. Most facilities are not designed to remove such small particles – the result is that microbeads find their way into our lakes, rivers and oceans.



Once in our waterways, microbeads attach to contaminants and sediments and end up transferring pollutants to the wildlife that ingest them. Recent studies have found them in the surface water and sediments of the Great Lakes and the St. Lawrence River.

Luckily, some people are recognizing the problems microbeads are creating and we are starting to see leadership and action on this issue. A number of high profile companies that use microbeads in their products have agreed to phase out the use of them within the next few years. Last year, Illinois became the first of the United States to ban the use of plastic microbeads in personal care products, and other states, as we Il as some parts of Europe, are working towards such a ban.

Most recently, change is coming to Canada on this issue: we were very pleased to see MPP Marie-France Lalonde introduce a private member's bill in the Ontario legislature earlier this week that would ban the manufacture of microbeads and their addition to consumer goods such as cosmetics and soaps. The ban would take place two years after the bill comes into effect, if passed. We will follow the course of this bill closely. We urge MPPs to support the bill and make Ontario the first jurisdiction in Canada to ban microbeads from personal care products.

You can also take action and play a role to help solve this pollution problem. When you are shopping for personal care products such as soaps, scrubs and toothpastes, please check to see if they contain plastic microbeads (the most common are made of "polyethylene" and "polypropylene"). Choose products with ingredients that are natural and therefore biodegrade in the environment.

Remember, everything you put on your skin eventually ends up down the drain when you shower. All household water pipes eventually lead to our river...where we swim, drink and fish.


