What a great summer we had! The water levels were low which made navigating in our lakes and rivers challenging at times, but the consistently warm and sunny weather more than made up for that inconvenience in my mind. Did you take pictures of your boating adventures? If so then how about selecting a few to share with the rest of us at our annual dinner in March? The slide show of member's photos we ran last year was popular so we will do it again. We can look forward to free lockage in the Rideau waterway next summer. This is one of the perks Parks Canada is offering to celebrate Canada's 150th anniversary. Hopefully it will encourage some of the boaters who abandoned the waterway when the locks operating hours were reduced and fees increased, to use this magnificent system again. In the meantime, how about taking a course to upgrade or refresh your boating safety and navigation skills? Please take a look at the list of courses we are offering in this newsletter.

This year's National AGM and Conference was held in Vancouver at the Sheraton Wall centre. Here is an executive summary of some of the new developments discussed during the conference.



Our teaching methods are transitioning to appeal to the way most people prefer to learn today. Although we usually receive very positive comments from the students who have taken our classroom courses, it is becoming increasingly more difficult to attract students and instructors for them. Online courses are more popular, but we cannot run most of our courses entirely online without sacrificing too much content, so online and in-class course combinations are being developed. This is called blended learning, and an example of this is the new online Seamanship course which has been

run successfully as a collaborative effort by the Ottawa and Britannia- Rideau squadrons. For this course the instructors teach 9 lessons online and another 5 in the classroom. Another technique gaining popularity is inverting the lecture versus the homework; having the students read the chapter text privately, then doing the homework in class under the direction of the instructor.

National is updating the Radar Course, which will include new information on broadband Doppler radar, and radar simulations which are embedded in the PowerPoint presentations. They are producing an "asynchronous" online version of the Introduction to Weather course which students can use anytime 24/7, and which includes links to videos hosted on U-Tube. The Marine Radio course is also being developed this way, but the exams will held at a local squadron.

The fully online CPS Boating basics course to earn a PCOC has been in use for a couple of years now, but some students have been frustrated when taking



the exam on the Transport Canada website because it will terminate the exam if not completed within the prescribed time. The Kingston squadron produced a version last April that is web based and self-paced like the National version, but includes a face to face review and the exam with a local instructor. 27 students have taken it so far, and now Court Harkness and Axel Obenauf from Ottawa squadron along with Tom Beaver of Britannia-Rideau are making plans to record similar presentations for the Boating 2 and 3 courses.

In recognition of his efforts to spearhead the creation of Kingston's improved online Boating Basics course, Past Kingston Commander Bill Corcoran was awarded the prestigious Mary Pritchard award for excellence in electronic education and outreach. He was surprised with this during the Education Department's luncheon. Well done Bill!

On the water practical instruction was discussed as a potentially popular additional service for us to provide. Some US squadrons do this, as does CYC, and the Windsor squadron. Challenges include ensuring proper insurance coverage, although National will assist, and if we use a CPS owned boat and charge a fee, the boat must meet Transport Canada regulations for a commercial vessel. Windsor squadron has avoided these requirements by providing the instruction on a student's boat, and the instructor does not touch the controls.

New names were unveiled for our primary boating safety and navigation courses, to better describe their content, and to show the intended progression. Here is what we will now use:

Boating 1: Boating Basics - Pleasure Craft Operator Card

Boating 2: Beyond Boating Basics

Boating 3: Introduction to Marine Navigation

Boating 4: Near Shore Marine Navigation Level 1 - grade designation P (Pilot)

Boating 5: Near Shore Marine Navigation Level 2 - grade designation AP (Advanced Pilot)

Boating 6: Offshore Marine Navigation Level 1 - grade designation JN (Junior Navigator)

Boating 7: Offshore Marine Navigation Level 2 - grade designation N (Navigator)

We continue to migrate away from naval terms to identify our organization; each local Squadron will be managed by an Executive Committee rather than a Bridge.

The expired flares disposal program proved to be very successful this year, with 36,450 flares collected across Canada. Several hundred of these were collected by OPSS during our event in August at The Chandlery, organized by Terry Hamilton with help from Ken Kendall.

Our Squadron received honourable mention for membership retention once again during the National awards ceremonies, and our Rideau District achieved several awards from the National Recreational Vessel Courtesy Check committee for performing the highest number of RVCCs in these areas:

1st place for a district: Rideau Most improved squadron: Kingston

2nd place for an individual (88): Bob McGill, Kingston 3rd place for an individual: Bruce Harris, Britannia-Rideau

The 1st place for an individual went to James White of the Port Albernie squadron.

At the National AGM these OPSS members were re-elected: Cathie Johnstone, to continue as the National Executive Officer Nancy Richards S, to continue as the National Secretary Linda Hamilton AP, returned to the National Awards and Flags Committee

And these OPSS members were shown deep appreciation for their past service: Don Tanner CN, retired after 4 yrs as the Assistant National Financial Officer Monique Pelland AP, retired after 3 yrs as the National AP course director Nick Baets CN, retired after 3 yrs on the National Environmental Committee

We can continue to be proud of the exemplary work our squadron members do for the benefit of our national organization.

I look forward to seeing many of you at our upcoming Christmas dinner and Bridge (Executive Committee) meeting with Santa on December 1. Offshore Navigation Course

Ever wonder how the early mariners found their way around the oceans of the world where no visible land masses could be seen for months on end and mechanical aids to navigation did not exist? In truth some never did succeed in returning. It is true that since the days of Columbus their knowledge of the winds and currents of the Atlantic Ocean in the Northern Hemisphere played a vital role in



ensuring they would once again see home; however as time progressed more viable means of determining Lines of Position, Dead Reckoning and Running Fixes developed to where today electronic mainstays in navigation consist in part to GPS', chart plotters, (charts) and radar to mention a few. At times we also pray that they don't fail us while underway. But truly like many of us curious boating enthusiasts would you not like to pick up a *Sextant* and feel confident that you could have sailed with the best back then? (Scurvy and dysentery are totally different subjects). I can assure you that it is a great learning experience taught by the best and you need not acquire a sextant as they are provided for hands-on learning purposes. We enjoyed every minute of the practical experiences.

Presently the *Ottawa Power and Sail Squadron* under the knowledgeable tutorship of Jim MacLeod and his team are conducting on behalf of CPS-ECP, a *Junior Navigation Course* which focuses on offshore navigation for the recreational boater. Many facets of current offshore navigational electronic tools and software in addition to conventional route planning techniques are covered but of particular interest for this student was learning to substitute visible landmarks with celestial objects as reference points, in point dazzle your partner and friends on a warm summer's evening while gazing up into the stars.

Alas the course is extremely interesting and I need emphasize again it is taught by the best instructors ever. The course infuses an added element of humour along the way which is conducive to making each class a most pleasurable experience. Like a vast majority of CPS-ECP courses a written exam is optional which alleviates any stress for those who wish only to gain the overall insight into this worthwhile course. Rideau District Sets New Course:

Centres of Excellence

CPS-ECP Rideau District will trim the sails and set a new course, the Council decided during its meeting October 1st at Treasure Island Marina.

The change will consist of establishing Centres of Excellence where all of the squadrons in the region will pool their skills, materials, and know-how in a kind of 'one-for-all and all-for-one' method of operating.

For example, where historically each squadron has been responsible for providing instructors, course preparation, and examiners for boating courses, the preparation of a course by one squadron will be shared with the others. This might include capitalizing on new technologies, such as online courses. A squadron will still have to locally provide a proctor, say, but the other aspects of the course do not have to be re-invented over and over on a squadron-by-squadron basis.

This shift from squadrons' working in isolation to sharing more resources comes in response to declining membership, reduced enrolment in courses, and challenges in recruiting members to serve on bridges. These factors not only affect the Rideau region, but also squadrons across Canada generally. Sailors are 'aging out', and individual squadrons are scrambling to make do with fewer and fewer volunteers and resources. "If we continue to lose one squadron, then another, then the district could be left with only two or three squadrons," district commander Guy Ladouceur told the council, as he introduced a presentation prepared by Tom Beaver of Ottawa and Bill Corcoran of Kingston.

Tom and Bill, who have been working together on the proposal since June, presented a high level perspective of the concept of Centers of Excellence, which contains elements Tom has borrowed from his professional experience with the federal government. Guy and Past District Commander Bryan Carroll, continue to play key roles in encouraging and vetting the work to date.

The presentation outlined four main themes, or areas where efficiencies could be achieved: in leadership and management, administration and stewardship, member services, and programming (which includes education and safety and environmental awareness programs, the mainstay of our mandate to promote and enable safe, responsible and enjoyable boating).

These themes would be addressed by teams of volunteers. Initially there would be an additional effort required to implement the changes, but ultimately, the efficiencies would result in reduced burden to individual squadrons that are struggling to find volunteer members to sustain their support to the boating community in Eastern Ontario.

The proposal represents an evolution in functionality of the organization, and does not require any structural changes. In fact, many of the thematic areas correlate to already existing roles in the CPSECP. "This is evolution, not revolution," Tom told the council. "It builds on existing structures and human resources."

The presenters emphasized that the Centers of Excellence is not a district takeover; it does not eliminate the district or any squadrons; and it does not combine financial resources into a common pot. "Money will stay within the squadrons."

"We are seeking collaboration and coordination," the presenters said, "that will allow us to do more with less, and draw talent from a broader community." Ultimately each squadron would be expected to both give and take in the sharing process.

The Centers of Excellence model does not propose a fixed structure; it permits the creation of adhoc groups as required.

"The five squadrons will operate in their own realms," Tom said. "We're proposing that the squadrons and the district work together in networked teams to help support programming and administration, benefitting from the synergies of the others."

The council unanimously endorsed the high level concept of establishing Centers of Excellence, and volunteers will work on defining a more detailed implementation in the coming weeks. The council reconvenes Nov. 12th to continue its work. In the meantime, Guy, Bryan, Tom, and Bill will continue to flesh out the process to establish the initial teams. Rideau District Facts and Figures -

- There are 966 members of CPS-ECP in the Rideau District
- Membership has been declining at a rate of about 10 percent per year
- As many as 75 percent of boaters taking CPS-ECP courses are not members of the organization, and do not support it through membership or volunteerism
- In most Rideau district squadrons, bridge members are filling more than one position
- Rideau district has five squadrons serving the Eastern Ontario area, roughly bounded by Kingston-Mattawa-Ottawa-Hawkesbury-Cornwall
- Two squadrons turned in their warrants to the national parent organization in the past five years
